

School of Ministry Designation Reflects Important Position at the University, Growing National Reputation, and Expanded Areas of Service in Meeting Theological Education Needs

The University of Dallas has announced that the Institute for Religious and Pastoral Studies (IRPS) has been rededicated the University of Dallas School of Ministry. This new designation reflects the School of Ministry's important position at the University, its growing national reputation, and its expanded areas of service in meeting the theological education needs of the Catholic church. The announcement was made during the 20th anniversary celebration on April 27, which featured a keynote address by the Most Rev. William Friend, retired Bishop of Shreveport, Louisiana, who was instrumental in establishing the IRPS.

Dr. Frank Lazarus, University of Dallas president, said, "On behalf of the University of Dallas and its Board of Trustees, I am proud to announce that the Institute for Religious and Pastoral

Studies has earned the distinguished designation of School of Ministry. This School of Ministry designation reflects the growth and development of the former Institute for Religious and Pastoral Studies as a theological education institution at the University of Dallas. The IRPS has established a reputation for excellence in its field, experienced major growth in the number of programs offered and students enrolled during the last five years and is expected to continue increasing its leadership role in theological education for the Catholic church."

The School of Ministry is one of the fastest growing graduate schools in its field in the United States. Enrollment in its five master's degree programs has increased from 26 students in 2002 to 130 students in 2007. Enrollment in its Catholic Biblical School's certificate program has increased from 70 students in 2002 to more than 620 in 2007, making it the largest program of its kind among all Catholic universities in the United States based on 2007 enrollment numbers.

Additionally, 100 students are enrolled in its deacon and faith formation programs. Enrollment in all its programs is projected

to double to more than 1,600 in the next four years.

Dr. Brian Schmisek, director of the School of Ministry, said, "The School of Ministry's goal is to be recognized internationally as a premier institution for those seeking theological studies, faith formation, pastoral skills and spiritual growth. We have assembled an impressive international faculty, formed strong working relationships with dioceses, and developed a certificate program through our Catholic Biblical School to deliver outstanding educational experiences for all our students."

The University of Dallas founded the Institute for Religious and Pastoral Studies in 1987 following a challenge by Bishop Friend to "take a decisive role in the theological formation and continuing education of Catholic leaders."

"Today, we are meeting the challenge Bishop Friend established 20 years ago by developing theological formation and continuing education opportunities for Catholic leaders and staff," said Schmisek.

More than 100 Students Graduate from the Catholic Biblical School

On May 19, the Catholic Biblical School (CBS) of the University of Dallas School of Ministry celebrated its second graduation with 102 students from 27 parishes receiving certificates of program completion. By contrast, this is three times as many as last year's 31 graduates.

The ceremony was held in the Maher Athletic Center on the University's campus in Irving. The graduation ceremony included a Mass celebrated by the Most Rev. Kevin Vann, Bishop of the Diocese of Fort Worth. Along with University of Dallas President Dr. Frank Lazarus and School of Ministry Director Dr. Brian Schmisek, Bishop Vann distributed certificates at the conclusion of the liturgy. A congregation of more than 500 was present to celebrate with the graduates.

"Graduates of our Catholic Biblical School program are prepared to serve as leaders in their parish communities because they have explored every book in the Bible from an academic as well as spiritual perspective, studying the historical context, literary style, and major themes," said Schmisek. "Providing this comprehensive educational outreach program reflects the School of Ministry's commitment to support the spiritual and professional development needs of the Church at the local level."

This year's class began the four-year program in the fall of 2003 and, for the first time, included students who completed their studies at sites in Fort Worth, as well as in Dallas. Students in the CBS program study every book in the Old and New Testament through a structured, four-year program. The program is designed to enable lay people to strengthen their spiritual development, coordinate Bible studies, and be a resource for others in their parish.

The graduates contributed over \$8,000 to the Biblical School Scholarship Fund.

The CBS began five years ago when 70 students enrolled for courses at three parishes in the Diocese of Dallas. The next year, the CBS student body increased to 200 students at nine host parishes. Today, more than 600 students are enrolled at 27 host parishes in the Dallas and Fort Worth dioceses. Classes are offered in English and Spanish through both classroom and online programs.

Focus on Scholarship: New CBS Workbooks to be Published by Paulist Press


Three Catholic Biblical School (CBS) faculty members, Gene Giuliano, Sister Dorothy Jonaitis and Angeline Hubert have been working with School of Ministry Director, Dr. Brian Schmisek, on revising the workbooks used by the CBS.

In 2005, Paulist Press contracted with the CBS faculty to create a new edition of each workbook. The first-year workbook, newly titled *The Catholic Biblical School Program*, will be published in time for the fall classes in September. Each year, from 2008-2010, a new workbook will be published until the set is complete.

Scholarship Shorts

Gene Giuliano led a 10-week series of talks on Apocalyptic Literature and the Book of Revelation at St. Joseph's Parish in Richardson, Texas. He has also taught the following programs and courses: a course on the Johannine Literature in the Adult Faith Formation/Deacon Formation Program in Tyler, Texas; the courses Introduction to Sacred Scripture and Introduction to Theology in the Faith Formation Program in Dallas, Texas; and Introduction to Sacred Scripture, Introduction to the Hebrew Scriptures, The Minor Prophets and The Major Prophets in the Deacon Formation Program in Fort Worth, Texas. Giuliano will also attend the Catholic Biblical Association meeting in Santa Clara, California, in August.

Angeline Hubert led a 10week series of talks on the Deuterocanonical Books of the Bible at St. Joseph's Parish in Richardson, Texas. She also gave a retreat to the RCIA group



at St. John the Evangelist Parish and a workshop on the Bible for the members of CARE, a group of religious educators in the Dallas, Texas, area. Hubert will also attend the Catholic Biblical Association meeting in Santa Clara, California, in August.

Sister Dorothy Jonaitis, OP, D.Min. presented a paper at the Society of Biblical Literature regional meeting in Dallas, Texas, titled, "Apocalyptic Literature and Dramatic Imagination." This summer Jonaitis and the Biblical School faculty will be leading "Introduction to the Bible" workshops throughout the Metroplex.

Sister Dorothy Jonaitis, OP, D.Min., has published an article on Good Friday in the March edition of *The Preacher: The Journal of the College of Preachers*.

Father Patrick Madden will attend the Catholic Biblical Association meeting in Santa Clara, California, in August.

Dr. John Norris presented a paper in Madrid, Spain, on November 18, 2006, at the 8th Annual Catholics in Public Life Conference at the Universidad San Pablo. His paper was titled, "Respeto para el alma del

residente extranjero: reflecciones sobre las responsabilidades del individuo católico y del pueblo contemporáneo." In July, Norris is presenting a paper at the International Society of Biblical Literature conference in Vienna, Austria, titled, "The Power and Danger of Allegory: Augustine's Interpretation of the Jews in His Preaching." He is also presenting a paper at the International Patristics Conference in Oxford, England, in August titled, "From Divine to Human: Changes in the Patristic Significance of Jesus' Birth from a Virgin."

Dr. Matthew Ogilvie is attending the annual meeting of the Australian Catholic Theological Association in July where he will present a paper on "Teaching Theology Online: Technological and Pedagogical Issues in Globalizing Theological Education." A version of the paper will be published in the Australian Ejournal of Theology. Ogilvie is also co-authoring a paper with Dr. Marcy Brown-Marsden chair of the biology department at University of Dallas, titled, "Teaching Evolution in Catholic Universities." The paper will be presented at the meeting of the Oxford Round Table in June and published in The Forum on Public Policy: A Journal of the Oxford Round Table.

Focus on Scholarship: Dr. Brian Schmisek

Dr. Brian Schmisek is presenting two papers at the annual International Meeting of the Society of Biblical Literature (SBL), which is meeting in July 2007 at the University of Vienna in Austria.

"The Body of His Glory: Resurrection Imagery in Philippians 3:21"


In his letter to the Philippians, Paul uses a rhetorical flourish to conclude his polemic against Judaizing Christians. The thrust of his argument in 3:20-21 is that Christians live by the power of Christ, derived from the Father, and not by the power of flesh. At the end of this rhetorical comparison, Paul adds a phrase about the effect of the resurrection of Christ, namely, that Christ will transform these lowly bodies of ours into the likeness of the body of his glory. This is not the main point of his argument, but a rhetorical flourish that brings the argument to a close. When asked later (1 Corinthians) to describe the nature of the resurrection in terms of soma, he offers an oxymoron, soma pneumatikon. Paul uses "body of his glory" only once, and when he has the chance to use it again (1 Corinthians 15), he does not. This shows that the term was not central to his teaching about the resurrection. Rather,

he uses it in Philippians to express the existence that Christ shares in the radiant presence of God that will also be shared by the Philippians.

"Resurrection of the Flesh or Resurrection of the Dead?"


Since the New Testament era, Christian theologians have attempted to define the resurrected body. At times antagonists who denied the resurrection caused this desire for a definition. At other times, theologians addressed the topic in commentaries on Scripture, without any reference to an ongoing denial. What is significant is that, from a very early period in church history, theologians began to speak of resurrection of the flesh instead of resurrection of the dead. Resurrection of the flesh does not appear in the New Testament; resurrection of the dead does. This paper explores the theme of resurrection in the New Testament, traces some developments of the concept in history, and concludes by positing theological limits to our discussion of resurrection based on biblical data.

Dr. Schmisek also presented, "The Apostles Creed: Articles of Faith for the 21st Century," at the annual meeting



of the National Catholic Educational Association in Baltimore, Maryland, on April 10. In his presentation, Schmisek examined how the 12 articles of the Apostle's Creed convey profound elements of Catholic faith. Yet, the creed makes no mention of sacraments. Participants in this session explored the creed and its applicability today, and were challenged to find new meaning and insight into this most ancient articulation of faith through questions such as, "What did the articles mean when they were written? What do they mean to a post-modern culture? How do we teach and live them in and outside class?"

Focus on Scholarship: Rev. Jerome T. Walsh



The School of Ministry is pleased to announce the following new text by Rev. Jerome T. Walsh, the retiring holder of the Tschoepe Chair of Homiletics:

Ahab: The Construction of a King (Collegeville, Minnesota: Liturgical Press, 2006).

His new work focuses on Ahab of Israel, who was king in the mid-ninth century BCE, and approaches him using narrative criticism and source and redaction criticism.

Our most reliable historical sources present a sketchy but generally positive

picture of Ahab as a stabilizing and successful political leader. By contrast, a detailed narrative criticism of Ahab in the Hebrew Bible yields a generally negative portrayal of his character, though with some surprisingly positive elements concealed in the background of the text. Since source and redaction criticism concentrate on the gradual development of written traditions as they are passed on from generation to generation, they offer an apt tool to investigate how the apparently positive historical figure of Ahab was transformed into the negative one of our present biblical text.

School of Ministry Holds Conference to Explore New Text from USCCB



The University of Dallas School of Ministry held a conference on March 23-24 to discuss and

explore the document Co-Workers in the Vineyard of the Lord: A Resource for Guiding the Development of Lay Ecclesial Ministry. The conference was held at the University of Dallas and sponsored by a grant from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB).

The keynote speaker on March 23 was Dr. Ed Hahnenberg, theological consultant during the production of *Co-Workers in the Vineyard of the Lord*. Hahnenberg is assistant professor of theology at Xavier University in Ohio.

Dr. Mary Gautier, senior research associate at the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) at Georgetown University, spoke on the topic of "Exploring National Trends in Lay Ecclesial Ministry."

Additional speakers of note were Dr. Amy Hoey, RSM, project coordinator for the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, who spoke on "The Forging of the Document: From Idea to Publication," and Dr. Geri Telepak, director of the Department of Formation and Evangelization for the Diocese of Austin, Texas, who spoke on "Technology in the Service of Formation."

2007 Landregan Lecture Featuring Address by Dr. Miguel Diaz set for November 3

The 2007 Landregan Lecture at the University of Dallas will be held on November 3 and will feature an address by Dr. Miguel Diaz, associate professor of theology at Saint John's University in Collegeville, Minnesota.


Before moving to Saint John's University, Diaz served as academic dean at St. Vincent de Paul Regional Seminary in Boynton Beach, Florida. Diaz was elected to the steering committee of the Association of Theological Schools deans and is a member of the Chief Academic Officers Society of the United States and Canada, the board of the Academy of Catholic Hispanic Theologians in the United States, and the board of the Catholic Theological Society of America. He earned the doctorate in theology from the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Indiana.

Diaz is widely published. He wrote On Being Human: U.S. Hispanic and Rahnerian Perspectives (Orbis Books, 2001), which was named Best Book of the Year by the Princeton Theological Seminary, and co-edited From the Heart

of Our People: Explorations in Systematic Theology (Orbis Books, 1999). He also wrote "Reading the Signs of the Time: A U.S. Hispanic Perspective on the Future of Theological Education," which appeared in New Horizons in Theology, edited by Terrence W. Tilley (Orbis Books, 2005), and "Theological Anthropology," which appeared in Handbook of Latinalo Theologies, edited by Edwin D. Aponte and Miguel A. De La Torre (Chalice Press, 2006).

The Landregan Lecture was inaugurated in 1999 to honor Steven T. Landregan, UD alumnus, prominent churchman, former editor of the *Texas Catholic*, and patron of permanent deacons in the Diocese of Dallas. Speakers are nationally prominent figures whose area of expertise reflects the many interests that have animated Landregan throughout his long, distinguished and continuing career of service to the Church in North Texas.



Catholic Biblical School Goes Online

"This has been an incredible year for me. I was not prepared to be this excited about studying the Bible. It has really come alive for me. Thank you."

This comment was made by a Catholic Biblical School (CBS) student after she completed her first year of study. What makes this comment particularly exciting is that this student was one of 16 who registered for the first online version of the CBS program.

In September 2006, she and other online students began a four-year journey into sacred Scripture that would take them through every book of the Bible. During their first year of study, the first online class covered the basics of the Old Testament: Genesis through 2 Kings. In September 2007, they will begin the second year of their journey, a year that will introduce them to the foundations

of the New Testament: Mark, Luke, Acts, Paul's letters, John, the Johannine letters and the Book of Revelation.

The University of Dallas School of Ministry began offering its CBS program online as an outreach to those who are unable to attend classes at CBS sites because of distance or conflicts with personal schedules. In 2006-07, students from Texas, California, New Mexico, Kansas and Missouri participated in online courses. One student, who began the school year attending classes at St. Michael Church in Bedford, Texas, transferred to the online program in November 2006, because she moved to Australia.

Online students are responsible for the same coursework as onsite students. They use e-mail to submit written homework and completed tests to the instructor and they participate in an asynchronous online discussion each week. They submit written homework and participate in online discussions for each lesson. Students are also invited to join a real-time chat with the instructor one evening a week. The live chat session provides an opportunity to ask questions, to share reflections and to socialize.

Beginning September 2007, the Spanish-speaking version of the CBS will also be offered online. The CBS provides a Catholic approach to understanding God's word and is intended for those wishing to meet the Lord in a deeper way through an in-depth study of sacred Scripture. Catholic Biblical School in Spanish



"The Spirit animates every class where the word of God is taught," said Professor María Pía Septién Ramírez. The same Spirit was at work throughout the year at the Catholic Biblical School (CBS) in Spanish, where 106 students attended weekly classes, shared their findings in small group discussions, and listened to lectures presented by the instructor.

"Thirty weeks went by very quickly," said Alex Perez, one of the students from the class at Saint Mary of the Assumption in Fort Worth, Texas. "We were learning so much, and getting countless new insights into Scripture that after each class we would go back to our everyday life with many new ideas to think about."

"Now my husband and I have very enriching conversations, I would relate to him what I learned that week and we would talk about it," said Yeni Montoya from the class of Saint John the Apostle in North Richland Hills, Texas.

"We finish the year with a warm feeling in our hearts and grateful to the Lord who made this class possible for us. It was a challenge to read Scripture, do homework and make it to class on time every week. But at the end of the day the course proved to be great, and confirmed in my heart the words of Deuteronomy: 'the word is very near you, in your mouth and in your heart, that you may observe it,'" added another student.

Save the Dates for Rome in 2008


The 2008 School of Ministry Summer in Rome Program will offer students the opportunity to earn up to nine graduate credit hours while spending up to five weeks on the University of Dallas' beautiful Rome campus.

The campus is located in the Alban hills 12 miles southeast of Rome, in a locale called Due Santi, where tradition holds that Saints Peter and Paul stopped along the Appian Way. Courses are open to new and current School of Ministry students, visiting graduate students, or anyone wishing to audit at least one course.

About 40 percent of the class time is spent on "field trips" in and around the city of Rome. During the evenings and on weekends, you may explore Rome and the surrounding area on your own, which is an experience you will never forget. Ellen, a student in the Rome Program of 2006, offers the following description:

"This educational experience affected me more profoundly than I could have ever imagined. When in Rome, I was a pilgrim on a holy journey. This took me by

surprise. I had embarked on the trip with thoughts of education and vacation in my head. I did not anticipate that it would be such an overwhelmingly sacred experience. I did not expect to have such feelings of awe, nor so many emotional responses. The visits to the various sites were very much of a 'felt' experience. I experienced Rome through my senses and my emotions, and because of this I absorbed more than I could have ever learned through a traditional classroom experience alone. I was able to stand in the middle of it all; see ancient sites; and smell, taste and feel the damp, dank air of excavations. If a picture is worth a thousand words, then celebrating mass at the crypt of St. Peter, the Scavi Tour, standing in the Colosseum, San Clemente, the catacombs, and walking the ancient Appian Way surely must equal a million."


Bill Huebsch to Teach in Fall 2007

The School of Ministry is proud to announce that Bill Huebsch will be teaching "Models of Catechesis" at the University of Dallas during the fall 2007 semester. Huebsch is a Roman Catholic theologian and prolific author, and a nationally known speaker on catechesis.

Huebsch holds a bachelor's degree in religious studies and a master's degree in theological studies, both of which he earned at the Catholic Theological Union of Chicago. He is a popular workshop facilitator and lecturer who has been involved in religious education and parish administration for over thirty years. He served five years each as diocesan administrator in the Dioceses of Crookston and New Ulm, both in Minnesota, and for many years as the Director of Religious Education at St. Stephen Parish, in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

In 1990, he founded the Vatican II project, which seeks to help keep alive the spirit and energy of the Council in today's church and world. He did so because he "realized with great force that people simply did not grasp the depth of this event, so I made up my mind to help people understand it better," he explained.

For the past ten years he has worked in Catholic publishing, helping to launch "whole community catechesis." He now serves as President and Publisher of Twenty-Third Publications in New London, Connecticut. He is the author of more than a dozen books, along with numerous booklets, articles and screenplays. Most recently, he has published Whole Community Catechesis in Plain English and The General Directory for Catechesis in Plain English (Twenty-Third Publications).

Juliet Mousseau, Ph.D. earned the doctorate in Historical Theology at St. Louis University in Missouri, where she also earned a master's degree in Historical Theology. She graduated with honors from Gonzaga University, in Spokane, Washington, where her undergraduate work was in Religious Studies and Music Theory and Literature.
